


Track Streets Of Fire

The annual Elsinore Grand Prix is such a race. Begun in 1968 (before ATVs!) and featured in the legendary motorcycle racing movie "On Any Sunday," the southern California event became one of the most famous off-road races in the world. In 1996, after almost 30-year hiatus, the race was revived and, for the first time ever, quads were included. Over the years, the event has attracted many of America's top quad competitors including Doug Eichner, Mark

Ehrhardt, Dean Sundahl, Travis Spader, Chad Duvall and Matt Smiley.

The high-speed course is a 6.5-mile loop and the start of the 30-minute quad race begins on Main Street in downtown Lake Elsinore. After going on and off some paved sections, the riders work their way into the foothills. One bobble on these fast, slippery and narrow trails can result in a tumble down a steep 300-foot slope.

Next, the racers tear into a valley with


IN HIS WORDS

EICHNER TALKS ABOUT THE 2001 ELSINORE GP

It was pretty cut and dried. I got the holeshot and led the whole thing. Lappers were a little bit of a problem, though; even more so than at Pont de Vaux, and that's 12 hours and 100 quads on a shorter circuit. If they'd move out of the way at Elsinore, I'd give them a courtesy wave. But if they'd stay in the middle it was tough because there was often only one line. Then, I'd have to muscle my way around. On one turn, a Banshee didn't see me coming and came into me.

I was also worried about fuel. I'm running a bigger carb, a 39mm with the 300cc Duncan PC 2000 cylinder, and I didn't have a desert tank. On the last lap I coasted down the hills just to be safe. Still, at the end I had very little gas left!

So, other than the fuel situation and lappers, everything was smooth. The motor ran great and the Lobo handles great. I will run a desert tank next year, though!





tighter corners, a crowd-pleasing tabletop and an 85-MPH excursion over the 1-15 freeway! Then it's back into the foothills and into town for the finish on Main Street.

This year, Duncan Racing's Doug Eichner took his third victory at Elsinore and became the winningest ATVer in the history of the race. Eichner knows all about being the "winningest" and he holds the record for wins at the famous 12 Hours of Pont de Vaux in France (see our December issue). The Oregon native is older than many pros, but his fiery style has won him other national championships in the stadiums and in the GNC Open class.

No, ATVs were not invented until 1971, but their inclusion in legendary races like the Pikes Peak Hillclimb and the Elsinore GP demonstrates that, although our sport is relatively young, it has already taken its rightful place in American racing history.
